# 7 Steps to Improving Student Attendance

#### **STEP 1**

# Remove Barriers to Attendance

Understanding the root cause of attendance issues and creating an action plan to resolving them should be your first step towards improving school attendance.

#### Actions to take:

- <u>Survey</u> staff, students, and families about student attendance
- Identify root causes, whether they be <u>physical</u> <u>or social-emotional</u>
- Create an <u>action plan</u> for removing as many of the barriers as possible

#### **STEP 2**

# Redesign learning environments and spaces

Creating learning environments that are welcoming to students and providing them with the resources and inspiration to be engaged and productive learners.

Actions to take:

- Visit other schools you've heard have <u>redesigned</u> <u>learning environments</u>
- Set up a tour of <u>startup</u> and innovation labs to see the environments of the jobs of the future
- Host a <u>classroom redesign</u> <u>challenge</u> where winners in your district receive funds to revamp their learning spaces
- Purchase or DIY <u>flexible</u> <u>learning spaces</u>

#### STEP 3

# Shift the mindset of school as a brick-and-mortar building

Consider ways to make it easier for students to engage in learning at home or in other locations.

Actions to take:

- Rethink <u>where school can</u> <u>be held</u>
- Purchase <u>flexible content</u> <u>and tools</u> that allow for students to work at their own path and pace
- Create <u>screencasts and</u> <u>flipped lessons</u> for students to review if they miss a lesson or need to review a concept again
- House your lessons in a <u>learning management</u> <u>system</u> so students can see them<u>even at home</u> (and eliminate the "dog ate my homework" excuse)

#### **STEP 4**

# Make Learning Authentic and Engaging

Rethink your lessons and activities so that students actively desire to come to school.

Actions to take:

- Introduce project-, problem-, or inquiry-based learning experiences for students
- Start a <u>genius hour</u> or WIN (What I Need) time
- Connect students with real-world experiences and experts through <u>virtual field trips</u>
- Give students choice in demonstrating mastery. Instead of a fiveparagraph essay, why not create a movie, podcast, blog, or stop-motion animation?





#### **STEP 5**

# Get Personalized

Tailor each student's learning experience to his or her unique needs, interests, and skills.

#### Actions to take:

- Employ the <u>Core Four of</u> <u>Personalized Learning</u>:
- Target instruction so that each student learns what he or she needs, when he or she needs it
- Employ adaptive digital content to give students immediate feedback
- Collect <u>frequent,</u> <u>formative assessment</u> <u>data</u> and share that data with students
- Engage students in reflection on and ownership of their learning journey

# Consider a mastery-based approach

Allow students to access content based on their mastery, not their grade level.

Actions to take:

- Prioritize standards, skills, and assessment practices that will help you determine mastery
- Involve stakeholders early on to ensure they understand the "what" and "why"?

#### **STEP 7**

### Improve Teacher Attendance to Improve Student Attendance

One of the biggest hidden factors behind poor student attendance is poor teacher attendance.

Actions to take:

- Rethink the way you are hiring and retaining your teachers as well as the <u>"shape" of your</u> organization
- Give teachers <u>increased</u> <u>flexibility</u> in their work day.
- Incorporate elements of personalized learning <u>in</u> <u>adult learning too</u>.

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
